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Love Thy Neighbour?

Growing up as a child - as I did moving every two to four years, I never really got to know



my neighbours. I never spent enough time anywhere to forge deep bonds with neighbourhood kids until I was in the 7th grade. The idea of the neighbourliness, or being a good neighbour, or bonds between the neighbours, was foreign to me. And so when, as a child, I first heard in church that the second greatest commandment was to "love your neighbour," I was a little perplexed and at a loss as to what that might entail.

I think sometimes as a Church – both locally and globally – we can be just as perplexed about who our neighbours are, and how it is to love them as Jesus commanded. After all, Jesus says this is the second greatest commandment; this is the commandment which follows directly from the first: loving God with all our heart, mind, soul, and strength. And so as a Church it seems like this is something we should get right, something we should be striving to live out in our walk as the Body of Christ.

Culturally being a good neighbour means being nice, saying hello, perhaps doing odd jobs for your neighbours – but unfortunately as a Church that just does not cut it. Jesus doesn't ask us be to be nice to people, and he doesn't ask us to be considerate or helpful. No, he asks us to love our neighbours; he asks us to be with our neighbours. In fact, while worshipping and enjoying God is the end and purpose of the Church, our worship is not true, complete worship unless we love our neighbours; our worship is not true and complete unless we

are with our neighbours and our neighbours are with us.

And so it is time at Grace Church, that we assess what it means to be a good neighbour at the intersection of Kennedy and Eglinton. First and foremost, who are our neighbours? Who are the neighbours that Christ calls us to love and be amongst? To start with, we worship in the midst of the poor, in the midst of those who are isolated, in the midst of those who lack access to good and healthy food, in the midst of refugees and new immigrants to this country. These are our neighbours, these are the people who Christ calls us to love, to be with and ultimately to worship and encounter God amidst.

Loving and being with our neighbour is more than just giving money or resources to support programmes which help – though that is important; it is about actually being with them, finding ways to encounter them, serve them, learn from them, encounter Jesus in them, and ultimately to come to a place where there are no distinctions between us and them: where we can worship with them and they with us. All that we have done up to this point -

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our Community Lunch, the Good Food Box, the English Conversation, and more – have been the baby steps of the Body of Christ here at Grace Church, but now it is time to learn to walk; it is our time to learn what it means to love and be with our neighbours here south of Kennedy and Eglinton and to act out of that love. It is time for each us to take stock of how we follow Jesus' command to "Love thy neighbour;" it is time for each of us to find ways that we can live out that command more faithfully so that we can enrich our common life and worship.


